How many of you dislike seeing people waste things? You just can't bear to see people throwing things out that still have a useable purpose... you can't stand to see people throw out food that could have been used to feed those in need.

To be truthful, I too don't like seeing people waste things, but more so I am heartbroken when I see people wasting their lives on things that just won't matter in the end.

Scripture has a lot to say about time and how we, as believers, are to make the most of our time. Eph. 5:15-16 tells us, "So be careful how you live. Don't live like fools, but like those who are wise. Make the most of every opportunity in these evil days."

How we value time will determine what we choose to do with the time He has given us. The problem is, we are so easily seduced by the frills and temptations of this world that we often surrender to the temptation easier than to the Savior and His purpose for us. Consequently, we tend to view time in terms of prioritizing our own purposes, plans, and goals. Then if we have any time left over, we grudgingly use it for God's purpose for our lives.

Waste is wrong! But far worse than wasting stuff, is wasting that which God has given us to use for His purposes. What if you had \$1,440 in the bank that you had to spend every day and none of it would be carried over to the next day? Many would have no trouble spending that money wisely.

The fact is each of us has 1,440 minutes every day to use for His purpose. This year, each of us will have 8,760 hours to spend. Allowing eight hours per day for sleep and eight more for work, (not figuring in days off), it leaves 2,920 hours to use for other things. How will we use those hours that God has entrusted to us? How will we use them in light of eternity? Will we waste a significant amount of time on things that really don't matter? Or will we use it intentionally, making the most of every opportunity?

This year has already begun... we can't get back the yesterdays, but we can live this year in the light of eternity, and we can do so with His purpose above our own.

In 2021, 326,000 Americans lived in sheltered homelessness, which refers to "people experiencing homelessness who were found in emergency shelters, transitional housing, or other temporary settings." Many people become homeless due to unforeseen circumstances, including job loss or low wages, physical or mental health changes, or sudden shifts in their homelife, such as fleeing an abusive situation.

Each of us was created in God's image, including those living in shelters or surviving on the streets. Those of us who are believers are called to honor God by serving others in need and sharing Christ. We have the opportunity to serve the homeless community through A Night's Welcome, a winter shelter that operates between November and March. HELP collaborates with area churches to provide our homeless neighbors with a hot meal and a warm, safe place to sleep. Contact Joanne Sweatt to see how you can support this ministry.
